

Pelaki Lokotui was born on July 7, 1963 in Tonga, to Reverend Manase Lokotui and homemaker 'Ilaisaane To'a Lokotui. He graduated from Tupou College, a Methodist secondary boarding school that trains students in Christian discipleship, located in Toloa on the island of Tongatapu, Tonga.

Pelaki married Taufa Liti Lokotui in Salt Lake City, Utah. Together they have a son, William Lokotui. They also raised their granddaughter Taufa Drizzel Leetham. Pelaki first served Tonga Fellowship in Aurora, Colorado, as a Lay Supply Pastor and later became a part-time Local Pastor there. During his pastorate years, he was involved with youth ministry and was a dedicated choir member. He loved to share



the Tonga Fellowship's choir with the Annual Conference and the annual Christmas concert in Aurora, Colorado. He was deeply respected by his Tongan congregation, as well as by all who knew him. His ministry with the Tonga Fellowship was bi-vocational; he worked as a building contractor in order to support his family, but his true calling was local church ministry. He loved serving as pastor, and felt it was what he was put on Earth to do.

Pelaki was known as a gentle-natured and highly committed pastor. He has been described as "clearly a man of God." When asked to pray in his native Tongan language during an English worship service, even non-Tongan speakers felt touched by God's spirit. Pelaki and his family moved to Utah to be closer to family during the end of his life. He spent his last days with his wife, mother, sons, grandchildren, extended family and friends.

Pelaki died on August 6, 2014 in Murray, Utah, at 51 years of age.

Having served since the 1940s in the Iowa and Nebraska Conferences, Jim was particularly active in the Rocky Mountain Conference during the 1960s when he served a circuit that stretched across the state of Utah.



He served appointments as an Associate at First, Fort Collins, Colorado; Pastor at Trinity, Kearns, Utah; Washington Park, Denver, Colorado; and Julesburg/Ovid, Colorado. He received the retired status in 1997. He particularly enjoyed his work in children's ministry at First Church and the Boulder Society of Friends.

Bud was compassionate and creative. He loved music, the outdoors, and hiking in the mountains. Most of all, Bud loved his family and friends.

Keith married Mary Jeanne Bechtold on November 27, 1952 in Brighton, Colorado. To them were born Randy, Merrikay (deceased), Carole, Rebecca, Shelley, and Suzann. They had 10 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Keith and Jeanne had been married for 61 years at the time of his death.

Keith was ordained a Deacon in 1955 in the Colorado Conference and later an Elder, and received as a full member in the Rocky Mountain Conference in 1957. He served appointments at Swink; Wiley-McClave; Aspen-Basalt; Brighton; Emmanuel, Denver; Ft. Morgan; and Greeley. He took the retired status in 1997. During his 40 years of

representative ministry, Keith estimated he performed 1,200 weddings, funerals, and baptisms.

During his pastorates, Keith coordinated with the Aspen Music Festival for a quartet of soloists, was named Brighton Citizen of the Year, help found the Platte Valley Volunteer Ambulance Service, mentored Iliff students, served on the School District Long Range Planning Committee, became Governor of Civitans, was a ministerial exchange pastor with a parish in Yorkshire Area, Great Britain, and was Chair of the Habitat for Humanity Board. Jim took the retired status in 2003. In retirement he served his Rotary Club, the Homeless Prevention Initiative and supported the starting of the Wellington Fellowship.



Bud died on January 19, 2015 in Colorado Springs, Colorado, at 78 years of age.


#### CHARLES E. MCPHERSON III

An author of *A Primer: The Art of Native American Beadwork*, she was founder and host of AlterNative Voices, a Native American music and news radio show on Denver Station KUVO-FM for more than 20 years. It was through this broadcast that Native American music and performances were introduced to thousands around the world.

A lifelong United Methodist and a national Native American ministry leader in The United Methodist Church, Susie served on many denominational boards, including the Native American International Caucus and was consultant to the Rocky Mountain Conference Committee on Native American Ministries. She was most proud of her work over the last two decades with the descendants of the Sand Creek Massacre.

Susie was also an artist and floor director at Colorado Public Television for more than 20 years. She was a beloved friend who sought to bring communities together and help all understand that every person makes a difference.

Susie died after a long battle with cancer on June 21, 2014 in Denver, Colorado, at 69 years of age.
